I believe the light and freedom of liberal religion needs to spread all over town! In other words, it's time to recommit to our mission and then put hands and feet on it. If Hope does this, I promise we won't be bored! But we may be changed. Life looks so different when we are open to possibility. And where there is possibility, there is hope.

You see, many churches try to be all things to all people, which creates confusion among members and visitors alike. Who are we, really? What do we stand for? How are we known? A good rule of thumb: if you have more committees than members to fill them, it is likely you are unfocused. If visitors only attend once, it is time to refocus. If folk claim to never know what is going on at church, then maybe it is because too many things are going on, period. If committees no longer function, it may be time to get back to mission.

Please do not confuse busyness with success. Houses of worship are not in the business of keeping folk busy and happy. Instead, they transform lives to change the world. I don't know about you, but the latter sounds exciting and full of promise. I want to be part of a life-giving movement, with an outwardly focused mission, that needs me to help fulfill its purpose. I want to have a stake in the outcome of the mission I'm serving.

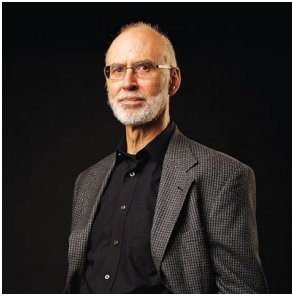

Music News

As we enter into a new period during which we leave behind us the recent political turmoil, we still have the challenge of the pandemic in our midst. The vaccines offer hope, but as this may yet take a lot of time to make a difference, we continue to deliver music virtually through weekly services with a small worship team live from the Hope Sanctuary. We are also preparing music for the coming virtual auction activities and festivities.

Speaking of the Hope Sanctuary brings to mind the notion of “sanctuary,” which is the place from which we musicians deliver our musical service to the community. Some of the various dictionary definitions include the following: “A place of refuge or safety; a holy place, a temple or church; the inmost recess or holiest part of a temple or church,” etc.

We need not fear to use this word for the place from which we proclaim just and truthful values and provide music as an offering to the community. When riotous insurrectionists stormed the nation’s Capitol buildings, I could not help but feel that their intentions and actions had violated the “sanctuary” or “sacred altar” of our democracy. A sanctuary need not always be defined as a place of worship; it can also be thought of as the central place from which a great work emanates and is sanctified through commitment to our values. It is no surprise that the inauguration, another ritual of our democracy, was accompanied by inspirational music and poetry, sealing the sanctity of that moment.

February's Generosity Recipient

Catholic Charities of Eastern OK (CCEOK)

Catholic Charities is providing emergency assistance, including food assistance to over 500 families a day – up from 75–100 families a day in Tulsa before COVID. Due to the increased demand, they have increased storage capacity for fruits, vegetables, meats, and other frozen products by installing new semi-size freezers and refrigerators in the warehouse.

All services are provided by staff and more than 3600 volunteers.

The main campus of CCEOK is located on North Harvard in Tulsa, but there are service centers in McAlester, Poteau, Muskogee, Broken Arrow, Bartlesville, and Stillwater. CCEOK welcomes all without regard for race, color, or creed; approximately 85% of those they serve are not Catholic. A majority of those they help are the working poor, barely getting by on a daily basis.

Catholic Charities relies upon giving by individuals and charitable organizations because it is not a United Way agency and does not receive funding from the Diocese of Tulsa and Eastern Oklahoma.

ACTION Update

ACTION previously was involved in connecting renters facing eviction to rental assistance programs in Tulsa that utilize CARES Act funds.

Currently ACTION is actively working with 20 nonprofits identifying and taking applications from residents who are behind on their utility bills as a result of the pandemic. Tulsa Community Foundation is serving as disbursing agent so that when an application from a person who is behind on utilities is approved, TCF sends payment directly to the utility company. This has been a monumental effort, identifying nonprofits who are able to work on this, as well as reaching out to utility companies to obtain their cooperation. A total of \$3.5 million has been allocated to this effort, and a household can receive up to \$1000 in utility assistance.

These are the most current and immediately impactful efforts ACTION has been undertaking.

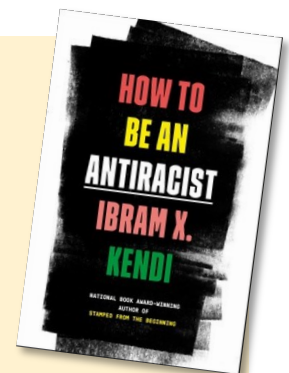

Gluttony, anger, greed, envy, lust, and sloth all spring from the garden of pride we cultivate in our souls. Pride left unchecked keeps us from knowing who we really are and isolates us from those we need the most. We can become egotistical and arrogant, putting ourselves at the center of the universe. Aristotle had much to say about pride and his words inform my own words about it.

How are those New Year’s resolutions working out for you? The gyms and health clubs always report an uptick in membership in January followed by a downturn come Feb. 1. The mind begins rationalizing, “I’m going to eat that because I deserve it. I’ve worked so hard on this diet that’s time for a diet-free day. I can always start up again tomorrow.” Gluttony becomes “sinful” when our obsession with food borders on addiction and drives our decision-making. The result is isolation from others with a little self-hate on the side. There are antidotes to gluttony, and we’ll explore them together on Sunday.
