



### From the Minister



#### We Are a Teaching Church

Unlike many modern professions that no longer rely on apprenticeship systems to bring on a new generation of practitioners, learning to become a minister includes a supervised internship. Hope Unitarian Church returns to being a formal teaching church on September 5<sup>th</sup> when our ministerial intern **Yadenee Hailu** reports for work. In the late 1990's Hope hosted **David Patterson** as our intern.

Every healthy church is a teaching church. Maintaining a religious community means constantly learning together. We learn "churchy" things — theology, history, and liturgy. We also learn pragmatic, human skills—how to cope with grief, ask questions of someone who has differing beliefs, how to volunteer, how to run a meeting, when to step forward and where to step back. We practice how to be forgiving, to be accountable, and to hold someone else accountable. In other words, church is always about learning. As religious educator Maria Harris famously claims in her book *Fashion Me a People*, "The church *is* the curriculum."

From Latin, curriculum means "course to be run." I have benefitted from your wisdom while running this course. This congregation has formed me as a minister. You have been patient with my mistakes, frank with critiques, and generous with praise. I expect you to provide these same gifts to Yadenee.

There will be many formal and informal teaching moments for her. Over time, she will teach, preach, make pastoral calls, write, and just be. As you get to know her and see her in action, you'll have opportunities to interact. In monthly meetings with her Internship Committee, she will have a safe, intimate group to discuss her learning goals and progress. Anne Steiner chairs this committee. Julia Harris, Rebecca Jones, Annie Simpson, and Larry Vandiver serve on her committee. I will meet one-on-one with her weekly to supervise and guide her.

Our Unitarian Universalist Association keeps this apprenticeship system for training ministers because you cannot solely study your way into being a minister. The praxis cycle of action, reflection, then action anew is at the heart of Yadenee's journey. It will be ours too as she teaches us. This is an exciting joint venture of learning together what it means to be a dynamic church.

# Year End Financial Information

Our church ended this year on a high note financially. We were able to set aside \$5,000 for future uses including our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration in 2018, our Facilities Maintenance Reserve and Community Involvement/ACTION. Even after setting aside that amount, we still had a net surplus of \$1,888 which carried over to Retained Earnings.

What made this possible? First, our income came in over budget primarily due to \$6,000 in additional pledge income and significant year-end donations. These more than offset underruns in some other fundraising including a garage sale budgeted for but not held. Second, our expenses were under budget. The expense underrun was throughout many areas of church activity and not isolated in any one specific area.

The detailed financial statements were approved by the Board at the August Board meeting and are posted on the bulletin board. # Did You Know...?

Did you know that in our most recent church year, we spent \$1,962.89 for meals that we provided to persons being served by the Tulsa Day Center for the Homeless? We served approximately 1,400 meals, as well as providing cereal and milk for breakfast. The amount of money required to provide these meals is less than it would otherwise be because the chicken, soup, coleslaw dressing and cereal is usually donated by Hope members.

Where do these funds come from? Most of the money came from our budget, \$1,208.70 in this recent year, and was made possible by your pledges. The remainder came from individual donations designated for this purpose.

Each month we have 12 to 15 people donate their time shopping for, cooking and serving these muchappreciated meals. Thank you to all of our generous congregants who make this important outreach project possible.

# Garden and Grounds

August in Oklahoma reflected the changing weather patterns - much more rain and cooler than is our history. Rare tornado (too close for comfort), but the Hope watering crews got a break. The patio pots have been almost overtaken by the lantana though the miniature roses are now reblooming. The (blue) caryopteris attracts many bees and butterflies. Monarchs are showing up - **Claudia Vandiver** found some eggs on our milkweed and is nurturing many caterpillars. The front beds are pretty with profusion zinnias, periwinkles, lantana and coleus. (Thanks **Alice Van Wormer**.) **Sherrill Womeldorff** brought in a load of mulch and Dogwood Trail has been "resurfaced" and some special trees (**Larry Sharp's** oak) re-mulched. Aesthetically pleasing and it minimizes erosion during hard rains. But a pile remains for redistribution during our fall workdays . . .

The Eagle Scout project (renovation of the slab area where the old AC used to be), has been approved by all the powers-that-be and will begin **September 2** and go for three Saturdays. The existing fence will be removed and a section replaced, a retaining wall will be constructed and the area reterraced. The slab will be repaired and a labyrinth painted on it. We plan a garden area in the new space after the construction is done. The surround-ing shrubs will be trimmed back and some of the fencing posts repurposed for trail edging. There are also some timbers left from the playground renovation that I also want to use along the trails (but it will take some strong backs to move them).

I am planning a Garden and Grounds early fall workday Saturday September 16, 8:00 am. The scout project should be mostly done and we can do some early fall clean up and trail maintenance.
