From the Minister

Beginning Yet Again

"Beginning" I begin my life over / It's easy / You take a deep breath / close your eyes / open them / and there it is.

The first lines of this poem by Greg Kuzma captures my intention for this upcoming, sixth year of my ministry with Hope Unitarian Church.

When I was hired by the church back in August 2013, the tone and needs of the congregation were different than today. The church called me in 2015. Fast forward five years

later where our world, nation, city, church, and each us are changed.

Within the Zen Buddhist tradition is an abiding practice to adopt a beginner's mind. Beginner's mind means dropping expectations and preconceived ideas to see with an open mind and fresh eyes, just like a beginner. When looking at everything as if it's brand new, we ask more questions. We bring curiosity and wonder to the conversation.



As your minister, I will be asking more questions. Why do we do this, this way? Who is missing from this gathering? Who needs to be informed? Who needs to be heard? What do we share? What separates us? Where are we going? Why? I will be asking myself these same questions. Am I setting the best priorities? What are my goals for the next church year? Is this the best meeting to attend? How can we make full use of our natural setting? How can I be more inclusive? What unseen assumptions still drive this moment?

With a new Board of Trustees and the approaching start of the next church year, Hope as an institution also begins anew. We welcome our new administrator Jenn Link. She will help us see the church system through beginner's eyes. We use the month of August to look afresh at our Unitarian Universalist tradition all month anticipating an increase number of guests who are church shopping.

Together we can all use beginners mind to ask questions. Are we interested in getting to know our part of town better—our neighbors, along with south Tulsa institutions and representatives. Who are they and how can we partner together more fully? Which local issues demand the strong voice of Hope Church?

Beginnings are rather arbitrary events, for all are preceded by other events. We choose our beginnings. Today, it all begins again.

July's Monthly Theme: Wisdom

I deeply value how our religious tradition opens it-



self to wisdom in all forms. We do not cling to the ideas of a single sacred book or text.

Specifically, we hold as strong values and moral guides a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn

from sources as diverse as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

These are the six sources our congregations affirm and promote: 1) Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life; 2) Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love; 3) Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life; 4) Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves; 5) Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit; 6) Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

Join us this month as we explore what is *wisdom* and where does it come from? We are still discovering together.

Our monthly themes express Hope Church's openness to theological exploration. They are not an endorsement of any particular creed or belief. Instead, they provide a monthly opportunity to examine in common a religious doctrine or idea.

Bugs, Bugs, Bugs!

It's July and the wild creatures are in full force on Hope Hill. We try to get the children outside when they attend religious education or event childcare. Fortunately, our beautiful grounds are blessed with many indigenous creatures; unfortunately, that includes biting insects like mosquitos, ticks, scorpions and chiggers.

The playground and some of the trails have been sprayed, but with the rain and the multitude of bugs that inhabit the Hill with us, you are strongly encouraged to take these precautions for your children:

Dress the child in long pants, socks and sneakers, as in this picture.

Spray the entire child with bug spray either at home or before you leave them at church.

Bug spray is kept in the cabinet above the sink on the left. Look for the sign and help yourself.

Upon arriving at home, check the child for ticks, which may be crawling or already attached. The shorter time a tick is attached, the less chance for illness resulting from the tick.

If you find a bite, treat it as soon as possible. These few steps, taken any time your child is outdoors, will make you and your child more comfortable in the great outdoors!

Garden and Grounds

Summer is officially here and the heat is coming. I am pleased to say that an earlier comment of mine about the wild roses in our woods being gone was incorrect. The blooms were later than expected and several clusters were pink along the road and the prettiest one was on the east side of the pond.

Essentially invisible again, the blooms are past and I will be looking for them next year. It is daisy, coneflower, zinnia and lantana time – Oklahoma summertime survivors. Sweet potato vine was planted at the Sheridan entrance – not very exciting, but it is showy and will grow abundantly in an area that is difficult to water.



Hope's milkweed patches are thriving, although I have not seen any monarchs yet on the hill or at home. An interesting article in the Tulsa paper June 23rd about declining insect populations monitors them (and wildlife of all sorts).

Find out more information on Biosurvey.ou.edu (research unit at OU), learner.org/north (Journey North citizen scientist project monitoring various wildlife). Iternet.edu (long term ecological research network – 28 sites), Audubon.org (birds), bumblebeewatch.org, nest.watch.org (Cornell). Citizen volunteers can contribute greatly to the collective knowledge.

From Cornell University (2018). The honeybee has hogged the pollination spotlight for centuries, but native bees are now getting their fair share of buzz: They are two to three times better pollinators than honeybees, are more plentiful than previously thought and not prone to the headline-catching colony collapse disorder that has decimated honeybee populations. Native bees are actually more effective pollinators than the honeybee --two to three times better. The wild, native bees are mostly pollen collectors. They are also more plentiful than once thought. In fact, native bees may have been doing a lot of pollinating work all along but not getting credit for it.

Fact: Native bees pollinate approx. 90% of our watermelons and sadly, the bee population is declining. What we do in our gardens here on the hill makes a difference to encourage biodiversity, which includes our bee populations.

All are welcome to visit the Vitex (Chaste Tree) off the patio toward the entrance to Dogwood Trail. Bees love it - honeybees, bumblebees and native bees of all sorts. It is beautiful too – important in a garden. Let's keep our gardens thriving together!
