

No. I don't want to. You can't make me! Sound familiar? Often, we feel our only choice is to rebel—and I propose resistance is not true freedom. So how can we uncover our vocation and feel empowered to choose it, even when the next step is less than ideal? How can we say yes to what we want more often than no to what we refuse to be boxed into? Let's explore these questions and practices together.

Listening to Our Dead

Far from being narcissistic, at any age writing your own obituary is a summation of your life. It is an opportunity to review the highs and lows. It is a chance to consider corrections or a new direction, or deepening into a path you are already on. It may help you name or claim your vocation(s). It can be a gift for generations to come.

October Monthly Theme *Vocation*

Vocation. Calling. Mission. These are churchy words to describe the undeniable sense that what you do—your daily actions, your work, your path, your life direction—fits your own personality and what the world seems to ask of you. The feeling is not always comfortable. What seems inevitable is perhaps the last thing you want to be doing. Your vocation may not be sanctioned by cultural norms and boundaries.

I just finished reading *She's Not There: A Life in Two Genders*, by Jennifer Finney Boylan. The beautifully written and observed autobiography describes her transgendered journey, from being James to becoming Jenny. She did this while remaining married, parenting two boys, and teaching literature on the faculty of Colby College. She resisted the change until she could no longer.

I certainly did not consider ministry my vocation until later in life, when it became impossible not to heed the urges. Now I cannot do otherwise. Being a mother remains a vocation. Yes, you can have more than one.

As author and teacher Parker Palmer observes in *Let Your Life Speak*, "Our deepest calling is to grow into our own authentic self-hood, whether or not it conforms to some image of who we ought to be. As we do so, we will not only find the joy that every human being seeks -- we will also find our path of authentic service in the world. True vocation joins self and service, as Frederick Buechner asserts when he defines vocation as 'the place where your deep gladness meets the world's deep need.'"

Join us as we discuss vocation with each other and share the deepest longings of our souls throughout the month. We explore monthly themes across all ages. Our children consider it in their weekly chapel. We explore it in worship. You can join a small group InReach group discussions for a more personal, unhurried examination.

About Monthly Themes

Our monthly themes express Hope Unitarian Church's openness to theological exploration. They are not an endorsement of any particular creed or belief. Instead, they provide a monthly opportunity to examine in common a religious doctrine or idea. Hope Church is a questioning community. It is a safe place to bring doubt and new ideas.

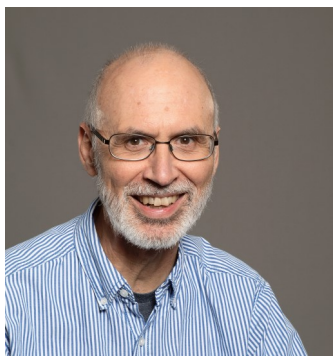

Five Wishes documents will be available, and assistance will be provided in filling out the document.

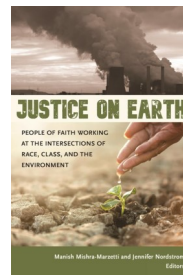

Hope Green Sanctuary Team

The December 2011 Board of Trustees' approved Charter for a Green Sanctuary Committee specified that it is "chartered to seek and obtain official recognition of Hope

Church as an accredited UUA Green Sanctuary congregation." That having been accomplished, the Green Sanctuary Committee no longer exists.

That was a necessary first step toward the 2011-2012 Board of Trustees' admirable long-term environmental goal "that Hope Church become known as a community leader in energy conservation & sustainability."

Hope is no longer being bound by UUA accreditation requirements, but is free to initiate meaningful local initiatives. In November 2017, the Board of Trustees assigned responsibility for leadership on developing programs to achieve the 2011 long-term goal to the Outreach Committee.

As of this date, two new programs are in stages of development by the Outreach Committee. Hopefully, many of you will have heard more about that at the Committee Fair last Sunday, but if not and you'd like to know more, we invite you to contact the committee's co-chairs, **Mary Newman** and **Anita Ward**, or any of the other six committee members: **Jean Coffey**, **Joan Scheulen**, **Lynn Walters**, **Mary Baird**, **Paula Haight**, and **Rich Jackson**.

Stewardship News

Did you know?

While we never have 100% renewal of pledges, for a variety of reasons (people move, for instance), we are pleased that **91% percent** of Hope donors renewed their pledges for this church year. Among the renewals, 62% of households increased their pledge, by an average of nearly \$400. This average increase amount accounts for about 10% of the costs of our hourly staff in the Children and Youth Religious Education Program. **Thank you, Hope community, for your continued generosity!**

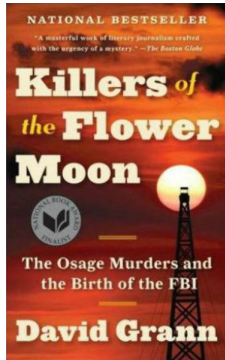
A note from the Green Sanctuary Team:
