# November Monthly Theme Formation

Formation. This is a churchy word to describe the undeniable sense that what you do—your daily actions, your work, your path, your life direction—fits your own personality and what the world seems to ask of you. The feeling is not always comfortable. What seems inevitable is perhaps the last thing you want to be doing. Formation pushes against cultural norms and boundaries.

I just finished reading **She's Not There: A Life in Two Genders**, by Jennifer Finney Boylan. The beautifully written and observed autobiography describes her transgendered journey, from being James to becoming Jenny. She did this while remaining married, parenting two boys, and teaching literature on the faculty of Colby College. She resisted the change until she could no longer.

My formation into ministry later in life pulled old and new skills into a minister. Now I cannot do otherwise.

As author and teacher Parker Palmer observes in Let Your Life Speak, "Our deepest calling is to grow into our own authentic self-hood, whether or not it conforms to some image of who we ought to be. As we do so, we will not only find the joy that every human being seeks -- we will also find our path of authentic service in the world. True vocation joins self and service, as Frederick Buechner asserts when he defines vocation as 'the place where your deep gladness meets the world's deep need.""

Join us as we discuss formation with each other and share the deepest longings of our souls throughout the month. We explore monthly themes across all ages. Our children consider it in their weekly chapel. We explore it in worship. You can join a small group InReach group discussions for a more personal, unhurried examination.

## **About Monthly Themes**

Our monthly themes express Hope Unitarian Church's openness to theological exploration. They are not an endorsement of any particular creed or belief. Instead, they provide a monthly opportunity to examine in common a religious doctrine or idea. Hope Church is a questioning community. It is a safe place to bring doubt and new ideas.
