WELCOME HOME!

If you come to worship on Sunday morning, virtually any Sunday morning, you'll hear the phrase, "Welcome home!" As a redemptive community of radical inclusion, we know the significance of place and the importance of becoming and belonging. As our lives move too busily from obligation to opportunity, it's nice to have a sanctuary of the mind and spirit for the cultivation of ideas and meaning making.

For some who cross our threshold our welcome may be the best news they have heard all week. I know it sometimes is for me, for those two words—Welcome home!—remind me that I am never alone, and am rarely as "lost" as I sometimes think. From the piano's first burst of sound to the Hymn For Going Forth's final cadence, I am pulled out of my daily fears and into a community that seeks to know me, fears and all. For one hour (at least), I am whole, almost holy.

This year I encourage you to make Sunday mornings at Hope Unitarian Church a priority. It's not about the number of members in the pews on Sunday; it's all about being ready for the challenges on Monday, and throughout the week. Sometimes it's the choir's anthem, other times it's a reading's insight or a prayer's petition. (It's rarely the sermon for me, given that I preach it, yet even therein serendipities may arise.) Whatever "it" is, I'm better for having the encounter.

We begin again September 8, Homecoming Sunday. I hope you'll continue to come to church throughout the year. Be sure to bring along any friends who need to hear our good news: Welcome Home! You'll find me at the front of the line.

In mid-August, the Hope Board of Trustees had a retreat at Holway Point on Grand Lake. We appreciate Marcia Holway Schaefer, Sherrill Womeldorff, & Lee Ann Cole hosting us there.



At the retreat, the Trustees set goals for this church year (in no particular order):

- Activating the Right Relations Team to evaluate many of our church policies.
- Transitioning our Nominating Committee to a Leadership Development Team.
- Evaluating our church committee structure and considering changes.
- Hiring a Director of Congregational Life who will help integrate visitors and new members into the congregation, retain our current members, work with our Care Team, and develop new opportunities for fellowship.
- Working toward repairing our roof, parking lot, and road.
- Becoming more involved in oversight of children's & youth policies & curriculum.
- Improving our publicity and use of social media.
- Charging the congregation to narrow its social justice focus by concentrating on one or more of the three Actions of Immediate Witness that were affirmed at the UUA's General Assembly in June.

The Board of Trustees has already begun working on some of these issues and we will keep you updated on our progress. For some of the goals, we are still setting measurable outcomes.

SEPTEMBER'S GENEROSITY RECIPIENT

September's Generosity recipient is <u>Iron Gate</u>.



Iron Gate's mission is feeding hungry people every day. They operate a soup kitchen, a grocery pantry, and a kids' pantry.

In 1978, three Trinity Episcopal Church parishioners stepped outside a men's Bible class to make a homeless man a sandwich. The ministry grew and the word on the street spread: "If you're hungry, go to the church with the iron gate."

Iron Gate separated legally from the church and became its own 501(c)3 organization in 1984. Since opening, Iron Gate has never turned anyone away who was hungry. For many years Iron Gate was located in the basement of Trinity Episcopal Church, but recently opened a new facility at 501 W. Archer.

Donation of Gap Pack Funds

In the spring of 2016 the Criminal Justice Outreach Program at All Souls Unitarian Church partnered with other churches and agencies to initiate the Gap Pack Program. A gap pack was a Ziploc bag containing basic essential items such as bottled water, a snack, socks, a thermal blanket, etc. They were intended to provide basic resources to help those in need in their first 24 hours out of jail. People were being released from David L Moss Correctional Facility at all hours of the day and night. They were released in all types of weather and often with no resources or places to go. In September 2016, Hope helped with this program by purchasing 250 Mylar blankets and donating \$150.00 for bus tokens. This was financed by donations from the Hope congregation and money from the Outreach budget. In 2017 Outreach raised funds for the items for a months supply of gap packs on the online crowdfunding site Faithify and also donations from Hope's congregation. Soon after the money was raised the program was put on hold. Homeless people were coming into the jail and taking several gap packs at a time so that the bags were not available for newly released inmates. The

jail was unable to find a more secure location to store the gap packs and the program was never reinstated. The funds have been in escrow since then.

In August the Outreach Committee donated the \$813 in the Gap Pack Fund to the Kiosk Program at New Sanctuary Network /Tulsa. This is an interfaith organization of local citizens committed to the dignity and respect of persons without documents. Their goal is to keep Tulsa residents from wholesale deportation. The New Sanctuary Kiosk Program is geared towards those undocumented immigrants who have been incarcerated at David L. Moss Correctional Facility. About \$40.00 is put in an undocumented immigrant's account at the jail. This allows the inmate to make phone calls and buy toiletries. If the person is deported the remaining amount is put on a debit card that the undocumented immigrant can take with him or her. Outreach felt using the Gap Pack funds in this way best honored the spirit of raising the money for the Gap Packs. Thank you to everyone who generously donated to this program in 2017, making this donation to New Sanctuary Network / Tulsa possible.

July Generosity

Resonance, our plate recipient for July, is a nonprofit supporting women challenged by the criminal justice system by promoting their well being and self sufficiency. The July plate collection for Resonance was \$852.00. Our Generosity collection averages about \$1,300.00, but at times does drop below \$1,000. Outreach decided to take \$148.00 from the Fair Trade reserve and add it to the July plate collections so we are able to donate a total of \$1000.00 to Resonance. Much appreciation to Hope's accountant, Rebecca Jones, for this recommendation. Thank you to everyone who purchases from our Fair Trade Cart for making this donation to Resonance possible.



Fair Trade (Equal Exchange)

Equal Exchange (EE) is a Fair Trade organization that buys directly from small-scale farmer cooperatives, owned and run by the farmers themselves. The farmers are paid above market prices for their crops. This enables them to support their

families and invest in their communities, while also farming in a sustainable way that protects the environment. The coffee is shade-grown, protecting forest cover and habitat for migratory birds and other wildlife.

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) Coffee Project is a collaboration between EE and the UUSC to involve more Unitarians in supporting small farmers around the world. For each pound of fairly traded coffee, chocolate, tea, and food purchased through the UUSC Coffee Project, 20 cents per pound goes to the UUSC Small Farmer Fund.

Outreach's Fair Trade cart in the Fellowship Hall has a variety of coffee, cocoa and chai tea ordered from Equal Exchange. When the weather cools, Outreach will order the delicious chocolate bars. Our Feed the Homeless program is on the third Saturday of every month. Cooks meet at Hope at 2:30 to prepare the meal; servers meet at the Tulsa Day Center for the Homeless at 5:30 to serve. CARE TEAM CORNER

If you are an older adult member of Hope Church, you might consider volunteering with the children in RE. Research shows that "inter-generational" connections between older adults and children have positive effects for both groups and for the community at large. Scholars DeVore, Winchell & Rowe



(2016) wrote, "Children have developmental and educational needs, and so do older adults. When people of all ages share their talents, support each other, and forge meaningful connections, both individuals and communities benefit." Don't take the Care Team's word for it: academic research (by Galbraith, Larkin, Moorhouse & Oomen, 2015) shows what we might guess to be true: older adults working with children show changes in their perceptions of aging and dementia, behavior, mood, engagement and sense of self. And children show equally impressive gains. So join in the fun at RE!

Mark your calendar! Hope's 2019 Auction is November 9th. This is a fun evening with good food and fellowship, but most important, it is Hope's most important fundraising event of the year. Your reserva-

tion fee buys you dinner, drinks and a bid card. More information about reservations will be coming soon.

Your donations and participation make the Auction successful, so put your imagination and your creativity to work. Here are the different categories.

Live Auction – These are the "big-ticket" items. Past offerings that have been popular were dinners and parties, vacation homes, basket weaving and other unique classes. Do you like to cook, entertain? Have access to something else that you believe would be popular?

Sign-up Parties – These are events and parties that are typically more casual and reasonably affordable. You, as the host, set the price and the number of participants, with these being sold on a first-come, first serve basis. This is the third year for these obviously popular events that have in past years included more dinners and parties, a dive bar tour, painting classes and others.

Gift Card Pull – For a \$20 fee, you can pull a gift card worth that much or more. Past years' offerings have been gift cards from restaurants, home improvement stores, and others ranging from a value of \$20 to \$50. These cards have gone quickly.

Silent Auction – These are the smaller items and frequently include jewelry, handcrafts, housewares, etc. We ask that these be new or gently used items that are unique and will be attractive to our participants.


