ALLIED COMMUNITIES OF TULSA INSPIRING OUR NEIGHBORHOOD

#### Student Loan Debt

Over 44 million people owe more than \$1.5 trillion. The impact on students, new graduates, parents, and adults returning to school is staggering. The team's meetings with OK Rep. Melissa Provenzano led to a legislative study to consider a Student Borrower's Bill of Rights. You can see the presentation to Rep. #### **Criminal Justice Reform**

Over 20 Court Observers were trained in partnership with Still She Rises and observed bail hearings every day through November 18. Observations of other hearings will continue through December. The team is observing and collecting data on how procedures and policies work in a variety of cases. Then they will be reporting our observations to Tulsa County District Attorney Steve Kunzweiler for the basis of further discussions.

#### Immigration Issues

The team is collaborating with immigrantsupport and criminal justice reform organizations in our community to plan a county level accountability session for candidates, to be held next May. To find out how you can be involved, contact Kris King at iaftulsa@gmail.com.

#### **Public Education Support**

The team is responding to teachers' stories of the impact the lack of children's mental health services has in their classrooms, and on the ability of many children to learn. The team is talking with administrators and experts in childhood trauma to explore ways for children to get help and for teachers to be supported in the schools. Team members are meeting with their legislators to share our agenda of issues that need to be addressed in the upcoming legislative session.

The next Education Action Team meeting is scheduled for **Tuesday, December 10, 2019, at 7 p.m.** at All Souls Unitarian Church, 2952 S. Peoria.

The next Strategy Team Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, December 3, 2019, at 7 p.m. Criminal Justice Action Team is starting to observe court proceedings for feedback to the District Attorney as to theory vs. practice. Observers are given court procedural checklists to fill out.


