Growing for Good

What are the signs of a thriving congregation? Every faith community is unique, yet there are some commonalities among those that make a real difference for their members and the wider community. Among them:

Good congregations **have visitors attending every Sunday**. There is a buzz among non-aligned seekers that something positive is happening and they are welcome to come and see.

- Good congregations **have an outward focus**. People come to be refreshed and refueled through ministries and then are a force for justice wherever life takes them.
- Good congregations **stand for something**. Far from being an outpost only for theological misfits, members can articulate what they do believe (as opposed to what they do not).
- Good congregations **exemplify a generous spirit**. Money is talked about freely and openly but is only one of several indicators. Congregants eagerly volunteer their time and enthusiastically share their talents.
- Good congregations **build a culture of generosity**. They understand that giving is, first and foremost, a catalyst for spiritual growth. That's the "What's in it for me?" of annual pledging. It changes you so that you can change the world.
- Good congregations **know their limitations**, even as they walk by faith. They don't keep adding programs. Instead they lead with their passions. They understand that virtually all church programs, events, and ministry teams have a shelf life.

Finally, good congregations **love the hell out of people**. It's why we're here! Bring your life's messes to us and we'll minister to them. Tell us why you don't fit in else-where and we'll make room for you here. Hold our hands and know that you're not alone.

Music News

You may have noticed that we are presently using an electronic keyboard

to accompany services at Hope. So what happened to our beautiful Baldwin Grand Piano? I believe we would all agree that beauty must be periodically nurtured and restored, or it will wither. Indeed, just before Thanksgiving I received a call from Cynthia Jenkins of Jenkins Piano Company, who was tuning our piano for Sing, Noel. Cynthia informed me that Hope's piano had problems that needed serious attention, but that she was going to do a temporary fix in order for the piano to sound good enough for Sing, Noel. This was not a total surprise, for Chris Powell had noticed for more than a year that the piano has been experiencing issues such as sticking hammers and blunt, insipid notes.

I should mention that the TU School of Music entrusts Jenkins Piano Company with all of the tuning and repair of their many grands and uprights, as it has done for over 30 years, including the two 9-foot Steinways that our piano faculty handpicked from the factory in New York. So after the New Year, I again spoke with Cynthia, and she explained the following.

The most urgent problem is that the backs of the hammers have become detached, and the hammers must be replaced. There is no way to repair this problem without replacement, which involves installing new hammers, shanks, and flanges. In addition, the damper and damper guide rail felts will be replaced, and the dampers and damper action will be regulated. The pedals will also be regulated, along with the trap work. Finally, due to wear and middle-age, the bass strings will be replaced for a more vibrant bass sound.

The piano was moved professionally by Tony Doss piano movers, and is presently at the shop at Jenkins Piano Company, where the parts are being custom ordered and installed, and the piano regulated. Once this work is completed, the piano will be moved professionally back to Hope Church. Thanks to a kind and generous donation by **Mr. George Krumme**, who originally donated the piano to Hope Unitarian Church, our beautiful 9-foot Baldwin grand piano with be endued with new life to enable it to serve the Hope community and make great music for many years to come.

MARCH'S GENEROSITY RECIPIENT

Our March Generosity Recipient is **Fransein House**, a new facility for women and girls who have been victims of human trafficking.

In keeping with its longstanding tradition of seeing gaps in social services and looking to fill them, Tulsa Metropolitan Ministry (TMM) has set its attention on the enormous issue of human trafficking in our city, especially in regards to young women and girls, and the lack of facilities or treatment to care for the very specific set of needs presented by that demographic. Tulsa Metropolitan Ministry, an 82-year-old interfaith organization, has been behind a number of community institutions that spun off into independent ministries, including Meals on Wheels, The Tulsa Day Center for the Homeless, and LIFE Senior Services. The next multiphase project will address the needs of women and girls who have been trafficked. The first phase will be called The Fransein House, named after Doris Fransein, former Tulsa **County District Court chief** juvenile judge. It will be housed near the Family Safety Center and will be a crisisstabilization unit with referrals for treatment and care. The next phase will be a "Tulsa Girls Home," similar in size and scope to the existing Tulsa Boys Home, and will be a residence program to help these victims recover and live more full and complete lives. Currently there is only one residence treatment center in the entire state. That needs to change and TMM is dedicated to changing it.


