Given that Oklahoma's governor has started the opening of the state, I thought it was time to share my own thoughts on Hope's re-opening. Of course, we all want to meet together again. Of course, we're all a little stir-crazy. Others are out and about, convinced the coronavirus is no long-

er a threat. This is untrue; this could be deadly. Other states to open today are Alaska and Georgia. Is this the right move?

All the experts and a preponderance of scientific evidence says that moving too quickly will spread the virus widely, making control of the virus impossible. We learn more about coronavirus every day, with new and unusual symptoms popping up worldwide. With no vaccine, we make conscious choices about our lives every time we leave the house. This is real.

What about Hope Church? When can we return to the Hill?

Although we have not determined when in-person worship will again occur, I do know this: We take the health and lives of our staff and the membership seriously. We seek to do nothing that would jeopardize the health and well-being of our members, visitors, and friends. We'll reopen only when the scientists tell us we can, only when national, state, and local governments have common answers to the re-opening schedule. Only then will we begin the discernment process about reopening.

Letter from the VP of Finance

Friends, much has changed since I addressed you as VP Finance and as your friend in my letter to the membership of March 25, 2020, describing some of the actions the Church was taking to respond to the emerging effects of the still ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. In fact, for the last month, we all have been learning to adjust to our imposed isolation, learning how to connect with loved ones and friends, and, for some of us, having something I'd never heard of, a thing called a "Zoom Meeting." If you haven't had one yet, a computer service provides the technology for a group of folks to see and talk with each other pretty effectively, without ever leaving home. It's surprisingly easy.

Four centuries ago, René Descartes articulated a rule that goes something like this: "Each problem solved creates a rule, which serves afterwards to solve other problems." Following Descartes' rule, someone sitting in on a Zoom Meeting got the clever idea to start having "Zoom Happy Hours." If you haven't been in on one, I recommend them. These computer social hours fill a void, and we should all give thanks to Monsieur Descartes. I hope you are finding new ways to connect with your family and dear friends, if only to talk and share laughs. Surely, we need to talk and laugh more than ever.

This is undoubtedly the greatest health challenge our nation and the world have faced since the Spanish Flu of 1917–18, even with all the advances in medicine the last century has brought. The phrase "global community" has new meaning for us all. Over the last month, the nations of the earth have almost without exception issued orders to limit social engagement; citizens of the world have been told to stay at home, in hopes that new practice may limit the spread of this horrible disease. The world has changed in one month. We all know "from what"; we can't foretell "what to."

Our Church has changed, exploring ways to connect with members and fulfill our mission without being in proximity to each other. As we all have stayed at home, Leadership and Rev. Greg and staff have been coming up with creative ways to deliver video sermons, programming for our children and adults, beautiful music for our soul, and caregiving for our vulnerable, not to mention outreach for our community's most at-risk citizens.

Maybe in the future, this will all be normal; until March, 2020, it was not for us. We may all take pride in doing our part, being responsible citizens, and yet, no one really knows where this goes or who among us or our loved ones may be afflicted. This is a nervous, disorienting time, one when we need most the comfort and support of our Church community.

So let us remember that in a crisis, and this is a doozy, everyone grabs on to what is most dear, most comforting. And more and more, we are reminded that is Hope Unitarian Church, for so many of us. Hope Unitarian Church, as its name implies, gives hope to us. May we receive, with open arms, this gift, and may we together be reminded: We are going to get through this. Pinkie-promise, friends, we are going to get through this!

Because my term on the Board of Trustees expires soon, I should imagine this may be my last submission to the Focus for a while. In reflecting on how I might conclude these thoughts to you, I've considered the writings of some of the great Unitarian Universalists for some sentiment as would seem fitted to the moment, one when we stay at home, seeking strength and pondering the meaning of our lives. Faced with the magnitude of all this, I decided the moment justified reaching beyond the teachings of our tiny branch of the Protestant Tree to othersscholars, philosophers, or spiritual guides in history who spoke words of comfort to those in their time, words which might be useful to us now. Even with that, nothing seemed quite right, UNTIL

...... like a magnet, I was drawn for inspiration to a source, who first was not obvious but does seem to capture our moment in time, perfectly:

Drive fast on empty streets, with nothing in mind, except falling in love and not getting arrested.

MAY'S GENEROSITY RECIPIENT

Our Generosity Recipient for May is Meals on Wheels (MOWS). MOWS delivers nutritious meals, does wellness checks and provides caring contact to elderly, disabled and homebound individuals in Tulsa and surrounding areas.

Many more seniors and other groups are now in need of emergency meals due to the COVID-19 crisis. According to the Tulsa World MOWS has tripled its clientele since Tulsa County confirmed its first coronavirus case.

MOWS is helping many more seniors sheltering in place, as well as families and individuals quarantined by positive coronavirus tests, first responders adversely affected by the disease and immigrants. Immigrant families are also being hit hard by this crisis. MOWS recently began dropping off bulk deliveries to churches in east Tulsa to aid Tulsa's Hispanic community. Their hope is to expand the deliveries to more churches on a weekly basis.

MOWS is using paid drivers to deliver a week's worth of frozen or shelf stable meals. Their volunteers now perform wellness checks and offer conversation over the phone, rather than making the deliveries and doing wellness checks in person.

MOWS will have a Zoom presentation at our virtual 10:00 am Adult Forum on Sunday, May 3rd.



With a great planting day we have achieved a point to step back, put hands on hips, and say "mighty fine." I am so grateful for gardeners with skill who are willing to pitch in with their expertise and for volunteers who are willing to do whatever needs being done.

Many thanks to Coe McGinley, Carmen Kinsey, Gail Hawk, Mary Newman, Lynn Walters, and Cathy Sleezer, who dove into work around the church gardens Monday morning while Nancy Hammill worked along the drive wrestling honeysuckle. Jim Sleezer makes the scrub brush and vine piles mysteriously disappear to the green waste dump. David Lynn's earlier cutting of over 20 Bradford Pears and an enormous amount of work from Anita and Jim Wood with power tools and determination have made a terrific difference on the hill.

Here is a partial list of what has been accomplished this spring:

5 Virginia Sweetspire and 2 Spirea planted (donated by **Mary Newman**)

Two beds of beautiful tropical milkweed grown by Mary are now waiting for Monarchs

Lantana from **Mary** and Celosia from **Cathy Sleezer** are in to add color in front and back

Priscilla from **Cathy** was added to spots in the perennial garden that had been cleaned by **Coe and Gail...** and others.

A number of redbud, black cherry, and other small native trees have been liberated from honeysuckle, greenbriar, and poison ivy along the drive. There is much more fun to be had there.

A major project in the Memorial Garden is under way with Coe and Gail cleaning out a bed of river rock, putting in new mulch, planting vinca, and adding Hellebores and Columbine to the bed. Anita Ward, Paula Haight, and Meredith Miller came along later and helped finish it up.

The front entrance is undergoing a facelift. The dreaded Monkey Grass is gone...over several stages...and the big flat rocks have been realigned more attractively. Hosta (divided from the back bed), Hellebores, and wild ginger have been added along the walk across from the pond, and Hosta and Japanese Fern have been added by the pond. More to come.

Janet and Gil came up to enjoy the Hill, Janet with trimmer in hand and Gil willing to dive into mowing. Many thanks.

The cement birdbath has been given a new home, and the tree stump it was hiding had rotted enough for Janet and Gil to clear it away.

We actually hired help for late winter cleanup which has freed us to do the more fun things.

We will need watering crews when the spring rains end. I am hoping that any one person would only need to come once a week and we can keep the areas small enough it will be fun.

I anticipate another focused day of work close to the time the church opens, adding summer color to replace pansies and making sure all is tidy for our grand opening. Everything that has been planted has been added with the thought of "who is going to take care of this?" I'm hoping for less maintenance work than in the past.
