A NEW YEAR OF INTERIM MINISTRY

Finally, it's the year 2021! I don't think I've ever looked forward to a new year like this one before. Oh, I'm not naïve. A simple change in date does not automatically eliminate the problems of the year previous. But I do think it renews our "can-do" spirit and energizes our will to never give up. It will surely be a year of change, no matter what! Remember, the only constant in life is change.

The Hope congregation knows this. We have compiled tons of data from the congregation: what qualities you are looking for your next settled minister, which traditions you hope to continue in the future,

which programs and events have outlived their shelf life, who Hope is now and who Hope wants to be in the future. Some of what Hope loves simply can't be sustained without an influx of new volunteers.

In other words, I'd rather be honoring our elders than to be asking them for yet one more favor. Talk about change!

I hope the new year changes you personally. We've learned a lot about what it means to be human as we make our ways through the pandemic. I hope your priorities have changed somewhat during this time of social isolation. I hope your circle of friends has expanded because we can no longer be in the same room. I hope spending more time with your children does not become only a temporary fix. I hope you'll value every breath, every touch, every kind word, and every smile. I hope you believe there is Hope in Tulsa!





Theme: Race Matters

1/3 – "If You Keep Silent"

This is the story of Esther, a Jewish woman who could not keep silent and hide her identity any longer. Even her husband, the king, does not know about her origins. 1/17 – "Nathan McCall's Dilemma"

You would never know by looking at him that the accomplished *Washington Post* columnist Nathan McCall had earned his journalism degree while serving time in prison. McCall easily fits our image of the Black Urban Professional. McCall didn't come from an impoverished innercity neighborhood but grew up in a middle class African-American enclave that drew families of means away from the ghetto. How did being Black create a diversion from the path of success that McCall's parents sacrificially plotted for him? How did liberal white allies help or hinder the life choices he made? McCall's dilemma speaks positively to our own feelings of inadequacy in race matters, both within the Church and beyond its doors.

1/24 - "Out of Many, One"

Religion, for many, presents one dualism after another: it's right or wrong, black or white, gay marriage or "traditional marriage," Jesus or Buddha, Big Bang or Adam and Eve. Yet a dualist worldview no longer squares with the world itself. In fact, to live among nature's unity while interpreting it dually creates a life out of balance. At least that is what the Ogala Sioux say and they should know: America's dualistic fervor changed their life of freedom into one of servitude. What the Ogala Sioux have learned about Nature's Way can inform our own responses to the dualist mold we are often pressed into by others.
