Peek inside this issue of Focus for a preview of the many wonderful things coming your way!

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

Reflections from the Minister

There hung in my parents' bedroom a picture of water crashing on the rocks. The sky, dark with pregnant clouds evoked a feeling of gloom, save for the ray of light that broke through.

I would sit in that room and stare at this painting. For some reason I needed to figure it out. Though it didn't seem difficult I felt like I was missing something. There was water, there were clouds, there was a storm, and there was a beam of light that represented hope. It was easy. What was I missing? In the years hence, I realized I wasn't trying to figure out the picture as much as I was trying to figure out myself.

It occurred to me one day, in Bible school when the teacher asked us how we imagined God, that I didn't think of God like the children around me. Most of them said they thought of an old man. I realized I didn't think about God that way. Immediately I thought of that picture. It was not of God, but God was in the picture. But I don't mean that God was the light, and the fact is I don't think God was the source of light.

It was more about the feeling that I had felt all those years ago.

What I began to understand in later years was the feeling of wonder, wonder in the face of unknown outcomes, wonder in the face of knowledge, and wonder in the heart that transcends our being. To this day, when I reflect on that picture, though I have forgotten much of it, I feel that wonder again, and I know that God is in that wonder.



The YOU in UU: Why We Joined

I had given up on religion in my twenties. Then I tried the Catholic religion again, briefly, in my thirties. God still seemed like some sort of "entity," but he and all the saints I was taught about no longer possessed the power I had given them for so many years. I realized I had become an agnostic. In my early forties I found myself in Tulsa, OK listening to John Wolf speak of Unitarianism on a local thirty-minute TV program on Friday afternoons. What a concept! No orthodoxy, only orthopraxy.

I walked into Hope in September 1996 and joined in December of that year. The people that I met and came to know and love were why I joined the church. I'll never forget John Wolfe saying that the only reason to join a church was to financially support it.

There have been a number of members of the congregation at that time that have left the church. I know that doesn't sound inviting, but I realized over the years that what many of us search for can be difficult to find even in a group as diverse as Unitarian Universalists. And like any church, it's congregated by imperfect human beings who in their zeal and joy of finding such an open community are able to forget the varying and contrasted ideologies and attitudes of the humanists, spiritualists, christians and unnamed others who make up our congregation. I feel that the common threads that connect me to other Unitarians are expressed in the Seven Principles. They are not doctrines. This religion and specifically our congregation is about respect for each other, action, social justice, and providing regularly for those in need in our community. These keep me connected to all the members who are here today.

I've shared why I joined Hope Unitarian Church and a bit of why I've stayed. Again, it's the committed that have kept the church alive during a devastating pandemic. I'm grateful. We continue to support each other as we go through life's challenges with so much love. And so I came and stay.


