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Reflections from the Minister

The Gift of Heritage

Heritage is truly a gift.

Our Heritage can bring us comfort during difficult times. I think back to my grandmother's table, covered in food, everyone smiling and laughing, I imagine the coolness of Sunday afternoons in West Virginia. The breeze that blew naturally through her house kissing the skin, peacefully and dreamily. Grandma would sit and tell me about life when she was a child, she talked about family long gone like they were still here, and I could hear in her voice the gentle pathway back to what felt like a simpler time. But heritage is not like hindsight, heritage is not 20/20.

I can reflect on the strength of my grandmother, the power in my grandfather's work ethic. I can listen to others talk about the good ole days and I even notice that I speak of those days when life was simpler, and everything was better than it is now. The world feels chaotic and divided, with storm clouds forecast for the coming days, months, and years.

It is easy to idealize The Good Ole Days, my parents do it, my grandparents did it, and I suspect the generations before them did. I can look back at my loving grandparents who would sacrifice anything they could for me, not to prove their love but because of it. I can remember those Sunday afternoons as and forget the struggles that went along with them. I can idealize my grandparents to the point of deification, but that would mean that I would have to idealize their prejudice as well, as wonderful as they were, they were strongly rooted in prejudice. Heritage is a starting point, an acorn that grows into a mighty oak. It is easy to wish we could recreate some idealized past while forgetting that the job of the acorn is to change, no one asks the oak to return to its previous state. In fact, it cannot.

Heritage is a double-edged sword, especially when it is used as an excuse to marginalize others. It is easy to idealize our heritage while forgetting the troubled nature and prejudice of past generations. Our heritage like an acorn is the beginning of change, not a goal to recreate. A reminder during difficult times that we are part of a lineage of survivors, and during the good a reminder of the adaptability of the human spirit. Heritage may shape who we are but can be very dangerous when used as a model for the future.

Heritage is truly a gift, but when idealized, it can also be a curse.

Our UU Educational Heritage

Religious education within the Unitarian Universalist (UU) tradition has a long history, dating back to the early days of Unitarianism and Universalism in the United States. Unitarianism and Universalism were two separate religious traditions that merged in 1961 to form the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Before this merger, both Unitarians and Universalists had their own religious education programs. The Unitarian religious education tradition can be traced back to the early 19th century, with figures like William Ellery Channing and James Freeman pioneering educational efforts within Unitarian congregations. Universalists also had their own educational initiatives throughout the 19th and 20th centuries. The formalization and development of UU religious education as it is known today largely occurred during the 20th century, with the merging of resources and philosophies from both traditions after the formation of the UUA in 1961. This merger brought together the educational practices and materials of both Unitarian and Universalist traditions into what is now the UU religious education program. So, while religious education has deep historical roots within both Unitarianism and Universalism, the modern UU religious education program, as it exists within the UUA, began to take its current form in the mid-20th century and was solidified after the merger of the two traditions in 1961.

Notable Unitarian Universalist (UU) religious educators and leaders have played significant roles in shaping the religious education within UU communities. Some notable figures include: 1.) Sophia Lyon Fahs: Sophia Lyon Fahs was a pioneering religious educator in the UU tradition. She developed innovative religious education materials for children, emphasizing experiential learning and exploration. 2.) John Haynes Holmes: A prominent UU minister and social activist, John Haynes Holmes was involved in educational reform and contributed to the development of UU religious education programs. 3.) Angus MacLean: Angus MacLean was a UU minister known for his contributions to religious education, particularly in the area of curriculum development. He authored several influential UU religious education resources. 4.) Charles Gaines: Charles Gaines was a UU religious educator and author who made significant contributions to curriculum development for UU children and youth. 5.) Denny Davidoff: Denny Davidoff served as the Moderator of the Unitarian Universalist Association and played a key role in shaping the direction of UU religious education during her time in leadership. These individuals have had a lasting impact on the educational aspects of the Unitarian Universalist faith and have helped to create a rich tradition of religious education within UU congregations.
