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#### REFLECTIONS FROM THE MINISTER

#### **Equality and Equity: A Reflection on Justice**

If you've spent much time in Unitarian Universalist circles you've no doubt heard the words justice and equity, in fact these words are central to our core values. Justice and equity appear in the current principles adopted in 1985 and are central to upcoming article II revisions in the UU world. Regardless, justice and equity are part of how we understand active love. A world where love rules, justice and equity are present. However, it is significant that the principles and the values of our faith use the term equity not equality.

During the month of December, I had the opportunity to discuss this with some of our Boy Scouts. Modern scouting requires training in diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) and that is done through a class called Citizenship and Society. One of the first exercises in the class is to define a set of terms, among those terms, equity, and equality.

Over all their answers were very good. But I noticed something in them that I notice in everyone who is asked for the first time to wrestle with the differences between equality and equity. I remember when I began to wrestle with these differences and unlike these scouts, I didn't begin to ask the questions until much later.

For much of my early life, even into adulthood, I assumed that equity was synonymous with equality. This is not an unfounded assumption since the words overlap and are from the same Latin root (Merriam Webster). In fact, you can find these words in the Commonly Confused section on Merriam Webster's website.

To understand the difference let's consider the gap between the words, sameness, and fairness. An equal distribution means that everyone gets the same amount and equitable distribution means that everyone gets what is fair based on need. Equal distribution sounds good on the surface until we consider not everyone starts in the same place, some people have a built-in head start. Equality can then become a tool used within systems of power as a tool of oppression, which is why we pair justice with equity. That doesn't mean equality isn't important, it just means it isn't cut and dry. When we approach

any system, we must be aware of power dynamics and understand not everyone starts in the same place or needs the same things.

Whether it is education or economics, building a truly equitable system creates many challenges. However, if we choose to center ourselves in love and work toward justice we too must wrestle with these differences. The path of equity is hard but worth it.






