# REFLECTIONS FROM THE MINISTER A REFLECTION ON THE STORIES WE TELL

I think the stories we choose to tell are often a reflection of ourselves. Our human family has been telling these stories for as long as we've had cognition. Whether we were sitting around the fire relaying stories of the hunt or sitting over a table with a glass of tea relaying the story of a symphony. Of course, there is a wide range of venues in between, like the pub or the church. We tell stories that make us laugh, cry, and dream. Our stories are set to inspire us or help us face the sadness that often comes with life.

The theme for the month of July is *Story*, and I will be honest, I am not yet sure how to convert that theme into sermons. But if I consider my past story, I know that not knowing how the story will turn out is no reason to feel fear; it is simply part of the journey. What I know is that, over and over again, I have been able to convert the theme into a sermon—a sermon that tells the story of humanity, a reflection of our journey together. Because remember, the stories we choose to tell are often a reflection of ourselves.

Our stories are a lesson in becoming and often a reason to hope. Because no matter the story, what we can learn from the story is that we have survived yet another day to come together in love for each other, ever relaying the lives we lead. # MacArthur Elementary School JANUARY GENEROSITY RECIPIENT

This month, we are proud to support MacArthur Elementary School as our chosen charity, recognizing the incredible work they do to foster excellence and provide opportunities for their students. MacArthur's mission is to cultivate lifelong

learners who thrive both academically and socially, equipped with the critical thinking and problem-solving skills necessary for success. Their inclusive approach ensures that every student, regardless of their circumstances, is given the tools and encouragement to reach their full potential. One of MacArthur's standout programs is the 21st Century Continued Learning Club, made possible through a grant from Youth at Heart. This free after-school initiative offers homework help, tutoring, and engaging activities like gardening and bike club. Students also receive a light meal, ensuring their nutritional needs are met.

Through the Reading Partners program, community volunteers work one-on-one with children to strengthen literacy skills, and additional partnerships provide food baskets. backpacks, and other essentials to families in need. These efforts embody the school's commitment to not just academic success, but the well-being of their entire community. MacArthur is also a Positive Behavior Intervention Support school, where the focus is on recognizing and uplifting positive actions. Students are rewarded for good behavior and attendance with weekly "paychecks" they can spend on exciting incentives, such as store items and special privileges. Their educators work tirelessly to deliver a rigorous curriculum, supported by professional development that enhances their teaching methods and creates meaningful learning experiences for all students. By supporting MacArthur this month, we can help them continue their vital work and make a lasting difference in the lives of these young learners.




