



As summer winds down, August at Hope brings a full calendar of opportunities to connect and build community. One of the most meaningful events this month is our Women's Equality Day celebration on Sunday, August 24. At the 10 AM Adult Forum, we'll welcome Kate Neary from the City of Tulsa Women's Commission, followed by a special service honoring the fight for women's rights and the work still ahead.

August 26th marks the anniversary of the codification of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which granted women the right to vote in 1920—after decades of organizing that began with the 1848 women's rights convention in Seneca Falls, NY. We'll also reflect on the Equal Rights Amendment, passed by Congress in 1972 but never fully ratified. Though 35 states approved it within the original deadline, it fell just short of the required 38 before the final extension expired in 1982. This history reminds us that equality requires not just intention, but persistence.

Join us as we celebrate the women who paved the way, honor the unfinished work of justice, and recommit to building a future where every voice is valued.

Beyond that, August is packed with chances to gather in both structured and casual ways. One special offering this month is a collaborative event between our Banned and Challenged Book Club and our ongoing movie night series. On Sunday, August 10th at 5 PM, we'll be screening The Outsiders, a story that resonates with themes of belonging, conflict, and identity—and one that has long found itself on banned book lists. We'll follow the film with a brief discussion for those who want to explore its legacy and continued relevance. It's a perfect opportunity to engage with culture and conscience in a relaxed, thoughtful setting.

Women of Hope meets August 7th at 6 PM for conversation and support. Game Night returns on Thursday, August 21st at 6:30 PM with friendly competition and laughter. Our monthly Hope Happy Hour is Thursday, July 24th from 5:30-7:00 PM, and Breakfast on the Hill rounds out the month on Sunday, August 31st at 10 AM. Whether you come for the snacks or the stories, we hope to see you at one—or all—of these events.

#### MEETING THE MOMENT: A REFLECTION ON GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2025

This year's Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly was held in Baltimore, Maryland. The theme was Meet the Moment. Since coming home, I have reflected on what it means to "meet the moment." There is no doubt in my mind that they are referring to this moment, where progressive values are under attack.

One of the answers to that question came with this year's Annual Ware Lecture. The speaker was award-winning journalist and trans advocate Imara Jones.

Jones took us through the history of the current movement against trans people in the United States. She tied the anti-trans movement to the rise of Christian Nationalism. She said during her lecture:

"There is no way to save democracy without standing up for trans rights. It literally is an impossibility. Because everywhere around the world where we see authoritarian movements right now, anti-trans politics are the drum major. You show me anti-trans politics and its sister anti-gender politics, and you can see an authoritarian regime which has already taken hold or is already on its way."

She reminded us that the trans issue can actually unify the right with parts of the left, specifically referencing Trans-Exclusionary Radical Feminists—feminists who draw the line at trans inclusion. The trans issue, when weaponized, can actually unify opposing sides, and that is partially how we got here today.

She reminded us of our principles: that we believe all people should be treated with dignity and respect. As a progressive faith that values justice and equity, it is important that we find ways to stand up for our trans and non-binary people. Her lecture helped me better understand how the timeline of the anti-trans movement is intertwined with the rise of Christian Nationalism.

The Ware Lecture, along with the rest of GA, makes me ask the question: What does it mean for us to meet the moment when it comes to Christian Nationalism? What does it mean to meet the moment when we see attacks on immigrants, trans and non-binary people? What does it mean to meet the moment when progressive values are under attack? The fact is, I'm not always sure. But it reminds me that we are called to be steadfast, and to keep our eyes open for the opportunities to let our

# FOOD THE MOVE **AUGUST GENEROSITY RECIPIENT**

Founded in 2014 by Tulsa native Taylor Hanson, Food on the Move began as a grassroots effort to address the lack of access to healthy, affordable food in our city. What started as a mobile outreach program has grown into a comprehensive initiative aimed at ending food insecurity by meeting communities where they are and working alongside them to build long-term solutions. From monthly events offering fresh food on a pay-as-you-can basis to partnerships with health providers and local nonprofits, their work is about more than meals-it's about restoring dignity, building connections, and investing in community resilience. Now, Food on the Move is expanding that vision with the construction of Food Home, a permanent campus that will serve as a hub for urban agriculture, education, food distribution, and innovation.

Located in North Tulsa, the new facility will house an indoor hydroponic and aquaponic farm capable of producing thousands of pounds of fresh produce annually. In addition to growing food, the space will also grow opportunity through training programs in agriculture, nutrition, and sustainability.

Future plans for the campus include a community gathering space, health and wellness programming, and eventually a full-service food market designed specifically for underserved neighborhoods. This bold project represents a shift from temporary relief to lasting transformation-focusing on empowering people to shape their own food systems and futures. By supporting Food on the Move this month, we're standing behind a vision of Tulsa where every neighborhood has access to fresh food and every person is part of a healthier, more connected community. As they remind us: "A community without a grocery store is like a house without a kitchen-it isn't a home."
