

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BUILDING BELONGING BY REV JUSTIN M. MCCREARY

While reflecting on the theme for the month, Building Belonging, I first notice something very simple, the theme is not simply belonging, and I believe that is significant. I have moved many times, born in West Virginia, college in Arkansas, seminary in Memphis and then I spent the next few years moving back and forth between north and central Mississippi to finally arrive home in Tulsa, Oklahoma. I was alone during many of those moves, oh I had help but I was coming to a place where I had no friends, no relatives, and no connections. It is within that environment that I understand the difference between belonging and building belonging.

Belonging is passive, it is intrinsic, it is something that happened to me when I was brought home from the hospital a newborn. Even my first friendships with peers were connections I made through my parents. But as I've grown older and moved from the womb of comfortable places, I learned something new. Belonging is no longer passive, it takes work.

I suspect when most people come to visit a church they are looking for somewhere to fit in, to belong. Belonging means that one is accepted and can find comfort in their surroundings. But in these places, it is important to remember that belonging is something that is built, it is not passive, and the onus is not always on the visitor to do the building.

How do we build a place where people belong? A place where someone walks in and thinks, "I can be myself here, I fit in, I can be home." This is the question I leave you with for the month of September, how do we build belonging?

SEPTEMBER GENEROSITY RECIPIENT

For more than 30 years, New Hope Oklahoma has served children and caregivers impacted by parental incarceration—always free of charge. What began in 1992 as a single summer camp has grown into year-round programs that give kids hope and support in a state with one of the highest incarceration rates in the nation. With research showing that children of incarcerated parents are far more likely to face incarceration themselves, New Hope works to change the story.

During the school year, New Hope offers after-school programs that focus on social and emotional wellbeing. Using trauma-informed, research-based practices, staff help kids strengthen resilience, decision-making, and

critical-thinking skills while connecting them with consistent peers and mentors. pathways of possibility for youth.

Each summer, New Hope hosts day and sleep-away camps for ages 5-14, filled with activities like swimming, hiking, crafts, science, and field trips. These camps provide safe, joyful spaces for children to build self-confidence and friendships. In addition, a licensed social worker provides case management and resource referrals, while community events—such as the Back to School Bash and holiday celebrations—bring families together. Whether through volunteering, donating, or spreading the word, Oklahomans can help New Hope continue to create change.

As we look toward a new church year, I'm excited to keep building together a program where all children and youth feel affirmed, encouraged, and empowered to explore their values, ask big questions, and live into the promise of beloved community.

LEGACY SOCIETY RECOGNITION




